Mastering the Art of Teaching English

Although we have great materials available in the Ventures Series to use in ESL classes, nothing builds more classroom connections than sharing personal experiences. No matter which unit I teach, when it comes time to challenge students to write, I create my own sentences or paragraphs. Here is an example utilizing skills: ing adjectives, vocabulary, and unit theme.

Following the unit reading, we have this discussion - What jobs have you done? (present perfect tense). How would you describe them using ing adjectives? This gets students to focus on what they have done in different jobs and what they may want in a future job. As an organization, we strive to help our ESL students find life-sustaining jobs in the community.

Here's an example of what I shared with my students during this activity as I modeled how to answer what was being asked of them: I love my job. I have been working as a teacher since 1973. I have worked in a shoe factory, a food processing plant, a restaurant, and a library. Of those non-teaching jobs, I enjoyed the library the most and the food processing plant the least. Let me tell you why.

Working in the shoe factory was **exhausting** and **boring**. I sewed the same seam on the same shoe style every day. It was noisy, and the music being played was **irritating**. Working at the food processing plant required me to stand at the line and pick out the rotten tomatoes from 8 PM to 1 AM. It was **tiring** and **disgusting**. It was **embarrassing** when I fainted one night

from the extreme heat and maybe from the smell.

In the library, the job was easy: putting returned books back on the shelf, sitting at the desk and checking out clients, and occasionally helping someone find a book. It wasn't very **challenging**.

In the restaurant, the owner taught me about good customer service. I liked talking to customers, but conversations were brief. It was **rewarding** when customers left a nice tip because they appreciated my speed and my attention.

As a teacher, I find my job is never boring. Learning about my students, their countries, and their cultures is interesting. Planning lessons is time-consuming but also satisfying. It's pleasing to see my students using team-building strategies during breakouts. It's energizing to see students speaking more comfortably and reading with better pronunciation. Keeping attendance records and checking to see why students aren't coming can be disappointing, but often, it is reassuring when they explain that they had appointments but they enjoy the class. Student questions are stimulating and energize me to work harder planning for the next class. Although sometimes the computer problems are frustrating and directions for fixing them are confusing, I am happily challenged to improve my skills at every opportunity.

This is a good way for my students to learn and practice English; it is also a great way for me to learn more about each of them.

These presentations will be offered on various topics like career options, postsecondary options, accessing food banks, becoming involved in the community, and more. The 23-24 school year has been great, and the new school year is looking to be even better for Success Center students as we work to transform lives, sustain families, and strengthen our community.

A Story of Difficult Choices and Hope: A Refugee Family's Story

There was one day, one extremely beautiful day in my past, in which my father came from his office and carrying two pens which had my father's name written on them. My father gifted one to me. After some days I went shopping and I saw a pen holder which matched the pen, so I bought that and gifted it to my father. We were happy, united family, but after a few years, the Taliban took over our country, our Afghanistan. My family had to leave because my father worked with American military as a doctor. My father was trying to rescue himself and our family, so we had to leave our house and go to Kabul. I took my pen and put it in my mother's purse. When we arrived in Kabul, the interpreter said to my father, "you, your wife and four of your children can go to America and the rest of your children will remain here in Afghanistan." It was a hard decision that none of us were able to make all of us were trying to have all of our family together in America or stay here in Afghanistan to die together. We were really worried because if my dad remained, no one knows what the Taliban would have done to him. Three of us

stayed. My mom took her purse that had my pen. My brothers and I came back to our house, and I found the pen holder that I had gifted my father. I'm still waiting with that pen holder until one day I will be able to gift it once again to my Habibi, to my Hero, to my dad.

This story, written by one of her siblings, was told to me by Malalay, a student in the Medical English Class and who also meets one-on-one with a tutor.

When Malalay took her posttest, she gained 39 points which is exceptional. Dan Weber said, "Malalay is a rock star."

When she agreed to tell part of her story, she included a note to her instructors: Becky, Sylvia, and Dan. It stated, "What would I do without you? Thanks for everything you constantly do for me. Your time and energy are my most precious resources. Thanks for giving me so much of it. You make me feel seen and heard and I love you for that. Please accept my most deep and sincere gratitude."
